Course Objectives and Outcomes

Prerequisites: Good level of fluency in a sign language other than ISL OR basic level of fluency in ISL

Course objectives:

- To gain a comprehensive understanding of the context of Indian Sign Language and deaf communities in India.
- To practice comprehension of generic texts in ISL.
- To improve productive skills in ISL across different text types including signed academic presentations at a basic level.
- To understand the grammatical structures of ISL at morphological, syntactic and discourse levels.
- To become aware of the role of sign languages, sign language data, and deaf participants in research contexts.

Course outcomes:

- Understanding the background of Indian Sign Language and its user community from a range of different perspectives.
- Increased confidence in using ISL in live conversations and in interacting with sign language users.
- Improved comprehension of ISL with respect to accuracy and range of contexts.
- Achieving a good level of knowledge in ISL grammar at morphological, syntactic and discourse levels.
- Acquiring a metalinguistic vocabulary to describe basic grammatical structures of ISL.
- Awareness of the role of sign language data and work with deaf participants in research contexts.

Skills:

- Improved ISL production and comprehension.
- Comprehension of academic literature on sign languages.
- Ability to produce different types of texts in ISL.
- Ability to understand both generic texts signed in ISL
- Basic video editing skills to produce a signed video asynchronously
- Presentation skills in ISL
- Skills in academic writing about sign languages and ISL

Assessment:

15-minute presentation in ISL about a topic from Unit 1, with edited video of the presentation	40%
Annotated log of ISL videos with generic content watched	20%
Written paper about selected topics in ISL grammar (1,500-2,000 words)	40%
