## Course Objectives and Outcomes

Prerequisites: Completion of “Indian Sign Language for researchers 1” OR advanced level of fluency in ISL

### Course objectives:

- To practice comprehension of academic texts in ISL.
- To improve productive skills in ISL across different text types including signed academic presentations at an advanced level.
- To understand the grammatical structures of ISL at morphological, syntactic and discourse levels.
- To understand the implications of using ISL in research contexts.

### Course outcomes:

- Improved comprehension of ISL with respect to accuracy and range of contexts, including academic contexts.
- Achieving an advanced level of knowledge in ISL grammar at morphological, syntactic and discourse levels.
- Acquiring a metalinguistic vocabulary to describe the grammatical structures of ISL.
- Increased ability to use ISL in research-relevant contexts (e.g. participant engagement, consent procedures, signed presentations, sign language corpora)
- Knowledge of practical, ethical and data quality issues in relation to Indian Sign Language data and research with deaf people in India

#### Skills:

- Improved ISL production and comprehension, including for academic content.
- Comprehension of academic literature on sign languages.
- Ability to produce different types of texts in ISL, including signing in academic contexts.
- Ability to understand both generic and academic texts signed in ISL
- Basic video editing skills to produce a signed video asynchronously
- Presentation skills in ISL
- Skills in academic writing about sign languages and ISL

#### Assessment:

20-minute presentation in ISL about a topic in ISL grammar , with edited video of the presentation	30%
Annotated log of ISL videos with academic content watched	20%
Written paper on issues of ISL data use in research (2,000 - 3,000 words)	50%
